

<i>Carrier</i>	<i>Guidelines</i>
<b>Accordia Life</b>	The couple must reside in the same residence and share expenses.
<b>AIG</b>	The gender of the couple is not considered if they have an insurable interest and can justify coverage financially. Would have to establish some type of relationship and significant loss if death occurs.
<b>Legal and General America</b>	If the partners live together and share expenses, mortgage, etc., LGA will consider as insurable interest.
<b>Fidelity Life</b>	There are specific state guidelines since some states accept same-sex marriage and some do not. Overall, Fidelity considers the economic loss to the beneficiary if the Insured were to pass away. This goes for both domestic partners and same sex partners.
<b>John Hancock</b>	Same Sex Couples and Domestic Partners have no restrictions as long as there is insurable interest between the two individuals.
<b>Lincoln National</b>	Specify if the partnership is business or personal and clarify if the parties have shared financial interests or children. No additional information is required to establish insurable interest.
<b>MetLife</b>	We will allow an individual to be named as spouse or domestic partner for the purpose of a beneficiary designation provided there is an insurable interest comparable to that of the a legally married couple. If the residence state does not recognize same sex marriage we would name them as domestic partner, otherwise they would be named as spouse.
<b>Minnesota Life</b>	Will consider these scenarios the same as married couples. Basically as long as they live together, have children together, share living expenses etc.

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**North American** As long as there is documented insurable interest between the two individuals we can consider.

**Protective Life** No published guidelines; will consider as any other couple, must live together, own a home, children, etc.

**Prudential** Clients can designate their partner as the beneficiary, no additional information is required to establish insurable interest.

**Symetra** Will consider if the partners live together and share expenses.

**Transamerica** Will consider as long as there is a clear and vested interest for the insured, for domestic & same sex couples. As long as there is a history between the two individuals and a reason for the coverage (financial loss to the beneficiary) then Transamerica will consider.

**United of Omaha** No specific guidelines. Explain circumstances in a cover letter regarding impact of financial loss to the partner.
